Helping the Terena Church fulfil their calling

The good news of salvation came to the Terena indigenous people in Brazil, brought by missionaries about one hundred years ago. The first Terena Christians were persecuted by their own people, but God opened wide doors and soon there were churches planted in all Terena villages. Today the majority of them are newborn Christians. The vision to reach other unreached indigenous nations for Christ was planted in their hearts and today more than 15 indigenous nations in Brazil have been reached as a result of the Terena missionaries sent out.

Emmanuel Brazil has been working side by side with the Terena Church since 2003. For us it is strategic to support the Cades Barnéia Terena Bible School and their efforts to better train indigenous pastors and missionaries. The training of indigenous Christian leaders is key for the evangelism of other indigenous groups in Brazil as Government has been slowly closing the doors, even for Brazilian missionaries, to work among indigenous people. This year the Terena Bible School has 9 students from four different ethnic groups, Terena, Cadwell, Kaiapó, and Xavante.

It also holds on a monthly basis special weekend theological courses for pastors

and church leaders.

Sérgio and Beth Souza, Emmanuel Brazil missionaries, are in their fourth year of ministry in the Bible School. They help with teaching, supporting the students in their day to day needs, and in the maintenance. They also visit Terena villages to help small churches in far away communities.

One of our goals is to help the Bible School become sustainable, as most village churches can't afford the students' tuition. We also want to help the students learn different skills, so they can work as tent makers when they become pastors and missionaries. Sérgio is a carpenter and we have started a carpentry project for the students. At the end of the course a basic tool kit will be provided to each student at a subsidized price. They can make chairs, tables, benches, and other simple pieces of furniture when they return to their villages. The items made in the classes are sold and the income helps cover some of the Bible School expenses. A fish pond project has also been started with the same goals and it is in its initial steps.

In the last decades the Terena people have suffered with local farmers taking their land. As a result farms have been invaded and roads have been blocked by Terena groups to bring awareness to their cause and force the Government to take the necessary measures to give back the land to the first owners. Today this has become a serious and sensitive issue and the Terena church leaders don't have a clear understanding about how the Church can respond to this situation. Emmanuel Brazil is helping them to discuss this issue, with the valuable help of Tearfund Brazil.

It is a real blessing to see that the Emmanuel International goal to support the Terena Church's efforts to build up strong Christian leadership and bring the gospel to thousands of indigenous Christians from other ethnic groups - despite the challenges, is bearing fruit for God's kingdom.
